Based on our learning, we have continuously improved upon our "Grassroots Management Training" tool to transfer complex entrepreneurial concepts for women to easily absorb the process of building and understanding the needs of their micro-enterprises at different stages.

Today, we have created 50,000+ entrepreneurs across 22 farm and non-farm-based value chains, a robust handholding support system, and touched the lives of more than 1 million women through our climate-resilient livelihood approach, across different remote parts of the country. None of this would be possible without the support of our donors, partners, and stakeholders. We sincerely thank you for believing in the power of women and walking alongside us to make a lasting difference.

JOURNEY SO FAR

The winds of change swept through India in the early 90s. Rapid economic growth, shifting demographics, and climate shifts threatened the delicate balance of traditional livelihoods in rural tribal communities. Poverty cast a long shadow, and the need for adaptation was urgent.

In 1992, amidst this dynamic landscape, Udyogini was born. Conceived by the World Bank, nurtured by the vision of (Chair and founding member) Late Ms. Ela Bhatt, and fueled by the spirit of SEWA, Udyogini emerged as a beacon of hope for India's tribal women.

Initially, we served as a bridge, empowering NGOs and government bodies with the tools to train tribal women in the art of entrepreneurship. We equipped them with essential management skills and market knowledge, enabling them to navigate the changing currents.

But by 2002, we realized it was time to dive deeper. Udyogini transformed from advisor to practitioner, crafting market-led solutions tailored to tackle poverty and ignite gender equality in tribal regions. The journey was paved with partnerships. With the invaluable support of donors, we honed our expertise in micro-enterprise and value chain development. We identified and nurtured 22 diverse income-generating avenues, from forest-based treasures like lac and tamarind to livestock rearing and farm-fresh ventures in vegetables and herbs.

Over 50,000 women in five states found their entrepreneurial spirit blossoming under Udyogini's guidance. Their incomes soared, and with them, their autonomy and agency. Families saw a tangible improvement in their lives, communities thrived, and the shackles of poverty loosened their grip.

This is just the beginning. Our vision for 2030 is ambitious: to double our impact and empower 150,000 rural tribal women. We remain unwavering in our mission to challenge the status quo, connect women with markets and resources, and build sustainable livelihoods that blossom for generations to come

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
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

Strengthening Ownership



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
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Village-Level Retail and Aggregation Centres (VLRACS): These local hubs connect women producers directly to markets, eliminating middlemen and maximizing profits.

Chhattisgarh, with its diverse value chains of donapattal, custard apple, tamarind, wild honey, mushroom spawn, and lac, serves as a canvas for women to not only participate but lead in the creation of sustainable communities.

Madhya Pradesh witnesses our efforts in oils, soaps, masalas, and dona-pattal, with a strategic vision to nurture a cadre of women entrepreneurs capable of making impactful decisions at every stage of the value chain.

Uttarakhand's unique ecosystem inspires women to participate in herbal products, herbal teas, squash, lentils, ghee, millets, aromatic seeds, rice, woolen apparel, and dry medicinal leaves to not only contribute but also drive value chain processes.

Customized Solutions

Our strategies remain grounded in the reality of each region. We understand that helping women climb up the value chain requires more than initial training—it demands ongoing support, access to resources, and a conducive environment for leadership development. We aim not just to create short-term economic gains but to lay the foundation for sustained and inclusive growth. A Case from Custard Apple Value Chain

Amidst the lush canopy of Kanker, Chhattisgarh, where mango, custard apple, and jamun paint the landscape with vibrant hues, tribal women once grappled with an invisible barrier. Despite the abundance of nature's bounty, their income remained meager, forever shadowed by unfair market practices. They were mere gatherers, while middlemen reaped the fruits of their labor.

Udyogini, recognizing the untapped potential woven within these fruit-laden branches, stepped in. Instead of focusing solely on harvesting, they envisioned a sustainable value chain that empowered women, not just enriched them. In close collaboration with self-help groups and farmer-producer organizations, they nurtured the dream of Nari Shakti Mahila Udyam Samuh, a Women's Enterprise Group (WEG).

Armed with data and fueled by hope, Udyogini unearthed the culprit behind the women's struggle: a broken system ripe with wastage, limited seasons, and inadequate processing. By establishing 23 Village Level Collection Centres, they ensured careful sorting and grading, maximizing both value and returns.

Within two years, a transformation blossomed. Over 20 tonnes of custard apple, 200 kg of mango, and 70 kg of jamun found their way into the capable hands of the WEG women. With newfound skills and confidence, they transformed these fruits into 200 kg of mango pulp, 150 kg of custard apple pulp, and 70 kg of jamun pulp.

But the fruits of this intervention weren't just sweet treats. They were whispers of self-reliance. The initial hesitations, the fear of negotiating with middlemen, all melted away in the face of their newfound expertise. Mastering business processes like documentation, negotiation, and accounting, these women weren't just gathering fruits; they were weaving a tapestry of economic independence.

This empowered enterprise, nestled within their familiar villages, struck a harmonious balance between work and family life. Each woman, armed with an INR 4,012 profit, witnessed a tangible change in their life. They were no longer shadows in the orchard; they were the sunlight, illuminating their communities with hope and purpose.

Udyogini's forest-to-fortune tale transcends mere numbers. It's a testament to the transformative power of a simplified, yet effective, value chain approach. It's a story of resilience, solidarity, and dreams taking root, proving that even the most intricate challenges can be overcome with hope, empowerment, and the spirit of community.



A Case from Lac Value Chain

Deep in the Kamdara block of Jharkhand, where ancient lac trees paint the landscape with their crimson sap, lived a community of tribal women grappling with an age-old foe - economic injustice. The bounty of lac, tamarind, and chironji promised prosperity, but middlemen held the strings, leaving behind meager returns and dashed dreams.

In 2008, Udyogini arrived, not with promises but with a practical plan: a value chain intervention tailored to harness the power of this community. Fueled by the women's unwavering determination and Udyogini's support, a journey began.

The heart of their mission? Lac. A natural resin grown on trees, it held the key to unlocking potential. Armed with a feasibility study and the indomitable spirit of 500 tribal women, Udyogini formed and then collaborated with Udyam Utthan Samiti (UUS) to establish a Common Facility Centre (CFC). This CFC, helmed by the women themselves, became a beacon of empowerment. No longer at the mercy of middlemen, they set their own prices and controlled their destinies.

But the path wasn't smooth. The pandemic's shadow loomed, pushing production costs skyward. Innovation, however, thrived in the face of adversity. A collaboration with Khethwork and the Selco Foundation birthed solar-powered, low-cost mobile irrigation systems, a testament to the adaptability woven into Udyogini's strategies.

Udyam Utthan Samiti's spirit didn't rest there. Recognizing the potential of Semialata, a fast-growing lac host plant, they embraced a sustainable future. A low-cost polyhouse became a nursery for 40,000 saplings, symbolizing not just commitment to their land but also their entrepreneurial spirit.

The transformation was tangible. Women of UUS, once hesitant, became deft entrepreneurs, navigating bank transactions, paperwork, and negotiations with newfound confidence. Their incomes soared, reaching between Rs. 8,000 and Rs. 10,000 per season, a testament to the power of self-reliance. They were no longer victims of circumstance; they were architects of change, lighting a path for future generations.

Udyam Utthan Samiti's story resonates far beyond their village. It stands as a beacon of the transformative power of data-driven value chain interventions. Empowering 500 tribal women, equipping 25 farmers with solar irrigation, and nurturing 40,000 nursery saplings are not just numbers; they are threads woven into a tapestry of hope and prosperity.

This is a legacy built on collective strength, unwavering belief in women's potential, and the unwavering commitment of Udyogini. It is a testament that economic independence can blossom even in the face of adversity, illuminating a brighter future for all.

Women engaged in diverse activities—lac cultivation, poultry farming, goat rearing, medicinal and aromatic plant cultivation, tamarind processing, honey production, mushroom cultivation, custard apple farming, oil production, and agriculture—have seen a proliferation of income streams, creating a positive wave across Jharkhand, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, Uttarakhand and Rajasthan.



Journey of Juliyani Devi as Pashu Sakhi

Imagine raising chickens not just for dinner, but as a stepping stone to a brighter future. That's what Juliyani Horo, a resilient woman from Jharkhand, discovered when Udyogini stepped into her village.

Life in Jaria-Gaurbera revolved around farming and a small flock of chickens. But for Juliyani and her family of seven, it was a constant struggle. Diseases ravaged their birds, keeping their income stuck at a meager Rs. 10,000-12,000 a year. Hope seemed as distant as the city lights.

Then, Udyogini arrived, carrying with them a message of poultry power. Juliyani, her eyes lit with a flicker of optimism, eagerly joined their training. From Udyogini's "Pashu-Sakhi", she learned the secrets of healthy hens - vaccinations, deworming, even building the perfect coop. This wasn't just knowledge; it was a magic wand.

As Juliyani put her lessons into practice, a transformation began. Her flock, once vulnerable, grew in both number and strength. Mortality rates plummeted, and income soared nearly triple, reaching a heartwarming Rs. 35,000-40,000 a year. The worry lines on Juliyani's face softened, replaced by a smile as bright as her thriving poultry business.

But Juliyani wasn't done yet. In 2021, she felt a pull towards another craft - lac bangle-making. Though initial doubts cast a shadow, a visit to a bustling bangle production house reignited her passion. With Udyogini's training and her own artistic flair, Juliyani's bangles soon adorned wrists far beyond her village.

And the numbers tell the story: Juliyani, once struggling to make ends meet, was well on her way to becoming a "lakhpati kisan" - a farmer with lakhs (hundreds of thousands) in income. This wasn't just a personal triumph; it was a beacon of hope for the women of Jaria-Gaurbera.

Inspired by Juliyani's success, more women sought Udyogini's help. Together, they formed a supportive group, their backyard businesses echoing with the clack of hens and the gentle tap of lac being shaped. Juliyani, from struggling survivor to self-made success, became a symbol of strength and resilience.

Juliyani's story isn't just about numbers and data; it's about the power of a single woman's determination to rewrite her own destiny. It's a testament to the transformative magic of Udyogini, empowering not just individuals, but entire communities, to weave their own tapestries of a brighter future.

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Success Story of Kanika as Fish Farmer

Nestled amidst 26 villages in Ramanujganj, a quiet revolution is brewing in Kamalpur. Kanika Mandal, a farmer with calloused hands and a heart full of hope, sits at the helm. Her 4-acre farm, once solely focused on rice, maize, and vegetables, has witnessed a transformative journey thanks to Udyogini's guiding hand.

It all began in 2023, when Kanika, alongside her husband Parimal, attended a crucial meeting held by Udyogini. Here, a new door to prosperity creaked open – the secrets of optimized fish farming. Armed with this knowledge and 1,000 high-quality fish seeds, Kanika's pond became a canvas for dreams.

Udyogini's support wasn't a one-time splash. Kanika received ongoing training on nurturing a healthy underwater kingdom – the right feed, the importance of good seeds, and the delicate dance of care and maintenance. With each lesson, her confidence grew, mirroring the ripples in her pond. The payoff is already stirring. Within six months, Kanika's net is predicted to cast a bounty of Rs. 20,000 to Rs. 25,000 – a catch that not only fills her family's plates but also elevates her standing in the community. From a hesitant learner to a content fish farmer, Kanika's transformation is a testament to Udyogini's dedication.

But Kanika's story isn't just about her. It's a beacon for other women, an invitation to cast their own lines and reel in a brighter future. Her success echoes Udyogini's unwavering commitment to community development, ensuring that every ripple of empowerment creates a wave of change.

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The drumbeat of climate change echoes across every continent, posing a stark challenge to the harmony of the planet and the livelihoods of its most vulnerable inhabitants. But amidst the storm, Udyogini believes in the power of innovation and entrepreneurial spirit to weave tapestries of prosperity not just for individuals, but for the planet itself.

In Jharkhand, where the crimson sap of lac paints the trees, Udyogini's interventions are more than just economic lifelines. They are whispers of environmental harmony. By promoting the cultivation of Kusum, Semialata, and Ber trees, vital partners in lac production, we actively contribute to carbon sequestration, mitigating the very force that threatens these communities.

Across the mountains of Uttarakhand, where the air hums with the scent of medicinal and aromatic plants, Udyogini's story takes a different turn. Here, we empower local communities to not only enhance their livelihoods by cultivating these precious herbs but also become guardians of mountain biodiversity. We train producers not just to gather but also to aggregate and create value-added products, ensuring a sustainable income stream while fostering responsible land management practices.

Collector training takes center stage in this symphony of change. By equipping communities with the knowledge and skills for the sustainable harvest and collection of these plants, we ensure that both people and planet thrive. This mindful approach, like a carefully placed stitch in a tapestry, strengthens the fabric of both livelihoods and the environment.

Udyogini is not just about empowering women to rise above economic hardship; it's about weaving a future where prosperity and environmental responsibility dance hand-in-hand. We believe that with every drop of honey collected sustainably, every lac farmer tending their crimson trees, and every mountain herb harvested with care, we chip away at the monolithic threat of climate change, stitching together a future where resilience finds its harmony with the planet.

Success Story of Harki Devi as MAPs Farmer

This case study explores the transformative journey of Harki Devi, a resident of Harni village in Dewal Block, Uttarakhand, under the 'Sampada se Samriddhi' project. Faced with challenges in traditional crop cultivation, Harki Devi embraced the opportunity presented by Udyogini to cultivate medicinal and aromatic plants (MAPs). The study delves into the initial challenges, interventions by Udyogini, and the remarkable results achieved by Harki Devi in terms of both agricultural and financial success.

Dewal Block, located in Chamoli district, Uttarakhand, is a key focus area of the 'Sampada se Samriddhi' project. Harki Devi, a local farmer from Harni village, traditionally relied on crops like paddy and wheat for her livelihood. However, faced with challenges such as inadequate water facilities and wildlife attacks, she sought alternative methods for sustainable cultivation.

In 2022, Udyogini introduced the cultivation of medicinal and aromatic plants (MAPs) in Harki Devi's village. Intrigued by the potential benefits, including minimal water requirements, she decided to transition from traditional crops to MAPs. The organization facilitated exposure visits, training programs, and provided initial support, enabling Harki Devi to cultivate plants like Kutki, Kapurkachri, Chamomile, Lemongrass, and Rosemary.

The community initially lacked awareness about the significance of MAPs, prompting Udyogini to educate them on environmental impact and sustainable harvesting. Pest challenges arose during large-scale cultivation, leading to integrated pest management training and innovative solutions. Additionally, the lengthy harvesting period for medicinal plants was addressed by introducing Aromatic Plants with shorter cultivation cycles.

Harki Devi's dedication resulted in the successful cultivation of MAPs on approximately 16 Nali of previously unused land. Financial gains from the sale of Kutki, Rosemary, Lemongrass, and Kapoor Kachri demonstrate the economic viability of this shift. Grateful for the support from her family, Harki Devi actively engages in village-level meetings, sharing her experiences to inspire other women.

Harki Devi's success in MAP cultivation not only improved her economic status but also contributed to community engagement and sustainable farming practices. This case study highlights the potential of empowering rural women through agricultural diversification, promoting environmental sustainability and economic prosperity.

Journey of Anita as Green Entrepreneur

The crimson sap of lac bleeds resilience in the forests of Jharkhand, where tribal women like Anita Indwar defy the harshest whispers of climate change. For Anita, lac isn't just a resin; it's a lifeline, a thread woven into a tapestry of empowered entrepreneurship and environmental harmony.

But the path wasn't always rosy. Anita, like many, relied on the fickle dance of seasons, her income swaying with the wind. Then, in 2017, Udyogini introduced lac cultivation, offering a chance to rewrite her story. With just three Kusum and one Ber tree inoculated, Anita birthed a crimson harvest, her annual income blooming to INR15,000-20,000.

Yet, the journey wasn't just about personal gain. Anita recognized the need for a bridge between producer and market, between the green whispers of the forest and the bustling hum of commerce. In 2017, she stepped up, establishing a Village Level Retail and Aggregation Center (VLRAC) with Udyogini's support.

The VLRAC became a marketplace within the village, an oasis where tribal women, who once struggled for fair prices for their non-timber forest products (NTFPs), could sell their lac and other goods in bulk, their bargaining power strengthened by collective action. But more than just a market, the VLRAC became a beacon of resilience. When the pandemic's shadow shrouded the land, disrupting markets and transport, Anita, with steely determination, refused to let her village be swallowed by its darkness.

She re-launched her VLRAC, her vision expanding beyond mere retail. Now, her focus is on aggregating local produce, ensuring fair compensation for the fruits of her community's labor. This isn't just about boosting incomes; it's about protecting the very forest that sustains them. By promoting sustainable harvesting and lac cultivation, Anita's story becomes a testament to the fact that economic prosperity can bloom hand-in-hand with environmental responsibility.

Through Anita's unwavering spirit and the transformative power of lac cultivation, Udyogini is weaving a tapestry of climate-resilient communities in Jharkhand. Every crimson drop of lac harvested, every market bridge built, every VLRAC that stands tall whispers a promise: in the face of a changing climate, these women, armed with the tools of entrepreneurship and the wisdom of their ancestors, will emerge stronger, their livelihoods and their forests thriving in harmonious symphony.

But soil needs more than seeds to flourish. Udyogini nourishes it with targeted training in agriculture and allied sectors, domains deeply rooted in the region's context and brimming with growth potential. From traditional farming practices to modern agro-processing, 14 distinct paths bloom like diverse plants, each catering to individual talents and aspirations.

And the harvest isn't just technical expertise. Business Skill Training (BST) equips these young women with the acumen to manage their ventures – financial literacy, marketing strategies, business planning – tools to nurture their microenterprises from fledgling saplings to robust trees.

This isn't a one-size-fits-all approach. Udyogini acknowledges the diverse tapestry of dreams and provides in-depth training ranging from 180 to 200 hours. It's not just a sprinkle of knowledge; it's a deep dive, ensuring competence and excellence take root in every endeavor.

The transformation is palpable. Young women shed the role of mere recipients and embrace the mantle of changemakers. They gain not just skills, but also the spirit of entrepreneurship, resilience, and unwavering confidence. This empowerment ripples outwards, touching families and communities, weaving a culture of self-reliance and economic stability.

Udyogini's skill development initiative isn't just a program; it's a beacon of hope. By equipping women with the tools and confidence to thrive, they're sowing the seeds not just for individual prosperity, but for a future where women stand tall as leaders, their fields flourishing with the fruits of their skill and determination.

Lac, once a mere livelihood, became a symbol of Sapna's transformation. Her family, initially skeptical of her modern methods, now marveled at her skill and foresight. She wasn't just contributing to their financial stability; she was an inspiration, a pioneer in their community.

Sapna's story is a testament to the transformative power of skill development. Through Tejaswini's nurturing ground and Udyogini's expertise, she blossomed from a housewife to a self-confident entrepreneur. Her harvest wasn't just lac; it was a harvest of skills, confidence, and a future brimming with possibilities.



POSH Workshop for Staff Members:


A virtual workshop on Preventing Sexual Harassment (POSH) was organized for all staff members, emphasizing the importance of creating a safe and respectful work environment.


Partnerships/Collaborations with Universities:






